PAY FOR COLLEGE

Read this information to learn more about areas you can explore to pay for college.

Type of Financing	Notes
Scholarships	 Typically free and do not require repayment Distributed based on need or merit from federal/state government agencies, private sources, social clubs, employers, special interest groups, or non-profit organizations Eligibility requirements apply
Loans Subsidized	 Borrowed money that must be repaid Need-based aid Federal government pays interest while you're enrolled in school, during deferment and grace period
Unsubsidized	 Borrowed money that must be repaid Need-based aid You pay interest throughout the life of the loan
Private	 Distributed by banks, credit unions and other financial institutions Eligibility requirements such as a co-signer or credit score may apply.
Grants	 Typically free with no repayment required Need-based aid from federal/state government or from private or non-profit organizations Must meet eligibility requirements
Work Study	 Earned through part-time employment for educational-related institutional costs Need-based aid
Out-of Pocket Payment Plan	 College expenses paid for by student, family or other Paid to lender over time Service fees and/or enrollment fees may be required

Employer Sponsorship Tuition Remission	 Employer-sponsored program that allows an employee to take classes at an institution with waived tuition Fees, textbooks and materials may not be covered
Educational Savings Plans	 Tax-advantaged savings plan designed to encourage saving for future educational costs Available in Virginia and in other states
Military Benefits	 Educational assistance available to service members of veterans and/or their families Must be active duty or a veteran of the U.S. Armed Forces
