TRANSFER GUIDANCE

Guaranteed Admission Agreement between NSU and the VCCS

This degree program is covered by NSU's Guaranteed Admission Agreement.

By meeting the following criteria, you are guaranteed admission to the B.S. in Communications:

- Earn a transfer associate degree based on the Communications curriculum.
- Earn a minimum of 2.0 GPA for the associate degree.
- A maximum of 63 credits will transfer and apply toward the B.S. in Communications degree requirements.
- Submit your transfer application for Fall admission by March 1 and for Spring admission by December 1, including an unofficial transcript.
- Request an official transcript to be sent upon completing the associate degree.
- Transfer within four years of first enrolling at the community college and within one year of completing the appropriate associate degree.

WHAT SHOULD I CONSIDER WHEN SELECTING COURSES?

- Students must complete 39 hours of coursework in major, 65 hours outside of major, and 15 hours in electives. 1 credit hour in physical activity is required to graduate.
- As a Mass Communications degree student, you will study foundational media topics like law and ethics, impact on society and media history. You'll also build your skills with courses related to your concentration, such as media writing, TV production, interviewing, photography and more. Round out your degree in Mass Communications with electives that align with your personal and professional interests, such as podcasting, media management, and media sales.
- Create a schedule for all required courses, pay attention to prerequisites and when courses are offered, and complete your first math and English courses in your first year. For help, see Transfer Steps and Resource Center at www.TransferVirginia.org.

IS THIS DEGREE RIGHT FOR ME?

- The Department of Mass Communications and Journalism offers two tracks that lead to the B.S. in Mass Communications. One track is a concentration in General Broadcasting and the other is in Journalism. The department also offers a minor in Mass Communication.

WHAT IS THE IMPACT ON MY DEGREE OF WORK I HAVE ALREADY COMPLETED?

- **Associate Transfer Degree Completion:** Completion of a transfer-level associate degree satisfies all lower-division general education requirements.
- **Dual Enrollment – Completion of Associate Degree in HS:** The agreement of guaranteed admission into the college applies to students earning an associate degree concurrent with high school who have completed a transfer-approved degree with a minimum of 45 credits completed through a Virginia Community College, with a GPA of 2.0 or higher and that meets all requirements outlined in the Transfer Guide.
- **Credit for Prior Learning:** All course credits that were awarded by the two-year institution for equivalent prior learning experiences (IB, AP, CLEP, Military, etc.) will transfer based on the transfer equivalence for the course awarded.
- **Catalog Year:** Catalog year determined by first semester of attendance at the community college post high school graduation. For students maintaining continuous enrollment, this entitlement will be in effect for a minimum of four years from the time of the student's first enrollment at the two-year institution. Students must enroll at the four-year institution within one year of completing their associate degree.

IS THIS COLLEGE RIGHT FOR ME?

- Completing your Associate transfer degree post-high school satisfies all lower division general education requirements and increases the chance of completing your bachelor's degree?

WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS DEGREE?

- Our major in Mass Communications provides a solid foundation that can be applied to a career in media, government, academia, marketing, or nonprofit work. Your communication, media, and storytelling skills will equip you for a successful career in whichever job you choose.

- Our Mass Communications degree graduates are employed in a variety of jobs in media and communications, including public relations specialist, social media manager, journalist, news anchor, news reporter, and TV and radio producer.
- According to the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics, jobs in media and communications are growing at a faster rate than other industries. You can expect an average annual salary of over \$50,000 though it may vary depending on your specific job within the mass communications field.

PROGRAM SUCCESSES & HIGHLIGHTS

- The department is nationally accredited by the Accrediting Council on Education in Journalism and Mass Communications (ACEJMC).
- Graduation Rate Trends: B.A. JRN = 29%, B.A. Mass Comm = 41%, NSU = 40%
- Our new on-campus television studio, WNSU–CCTV47, and updated radio station, WNSB Hot 91.1 FM, feature the same advanced technology used in professional studios, including high-definition video production switchers, audio mixers, studio cameras and a crane camera.
- Students gain knowledge of TV and radio production and directing and experience a live studio program.

WHAT ARE MY CHANCES FOR GETTING ACCEPTED?

- The most important success strategy in this program is to adhere to the prerequisite sequences, as indicated on the Communications curriculum.
- NSU accepts close to 90 percent of students who complete an application.
