By meeting the following criteria, you are eligible for admission. Separate admission to the English major is not required.

- Earn a transfer associate degree
- Earn a minimum GPA of 3.0 for your associate degree
- Earn grades of "C" or higher in all your courses for the associate degree to be eligible to transfer those credits.

#### WHAT SHOULD I CONSIDER WHEN SELECTING COURSES?

- UMW requires proficiency in a second language as part of the general education requirements. This can be satisfied in a number of ways including completing four years of language in high school, transferring credits from a community college, or completing a sequence of language courses through the 201 level at UMW. American Sign Language is accepted for transfer as a second language. #### IS THIS DEGREE RIGHT FOR ME?

• The English major is for people who love language and literature and have a passion for applying the creative and analytic mindset fostered by deep engagement with language and literature to a wide variety of real-world contexts. English majors typically enjoy engaging in conversations about the impact and meaning of literary texts and also typically develop outstanding communication and intercultural skills.

#### WHAT IS THE IMPACT ON MY DEGREE OF WORK I HAVE ALREADY COMPLETED?

- Associate Transfer Degree Completion: Transfer students with a VCCS transferable
  associate degree have completed the UMW general education requirements except
  second language competency, digital intensive, diverse and global perspectives, after
  Mary Washington, and beyond the classroom general education requirements.
   Several of these requirements are integrated into the computer science major. UMW
  does allow students to satisfy these requirements through qualifying transfer
  coursework.
- Dual Enrollment- Completion of Associate Degree in HS: Students participating in dual enrollment programs are considered as freshman applicants. Dual enrollment courses taken at the high school are treated identically with the same course when taken on a

- college campus; dual enrollment status does not affect the transferability of the course.
- Credit for Prior Learning: UMW accepts credit for AP, IB, CLEP, Cambridge, and other
  qualifying previous coursework. Equivalencies are provided here:

- Completing your Associate transfer degree post-high school satisfies all lower division general education requirements and increases the chance of completing your bachelor's degree?
- Exceeding 3 years or 90 credits at your community college means you may have exhausted your financial aid at that college and have limited your future financial aid at UMW.

#### WHAT CAN I DO WITH THIS DEGREE?

- Many English majors hope to find careers in writing or publishing, whether as a best-selling novelist or as the go-to staff person for writing reports, proposals, speeches, and the like. Others pursue pathways in teaching, most often in the K-12 system but also, on occasion, at the college or university level. Many students end up working in business settings (for example, in a Public Relations or Marketing department) or in a non-profit setting, where communication skills are also at a premium. The core skills of the English major—reading and analyzing literary texts, conducting research about the literary, cultural, and historical contexts of literary works, and, most importantly, developing advanced writing skills—are all skills readily transferable to the job market.

#### DO MORE WITH YOUR DEGREE!

Many students leverage the skills they acquire in the English classroom by seeking advanced certificates or accreditations in areas like professional writing, technical writing, publishing, and editing. The most common pathway is to pursue an advanced degree in Education, with the goal of teaching English in the K-12 system. Others use English as a foundation to pursue a JD, in order to practice law. We have even had English majors follow medical school and nursing pathways, since English provides a strong foundation not only in communication skills but also in intercultural competencies.

#### OTHER THAN CLASSES, ARE THERE OTHER PROGRAM REQUIREMENTS?

- Students must earn at least 30 credits at UMW as a degree-seeking student (not including physical education credits).
- Students must earn a GPA of 2.0 in both their major and overall coursework in order to complete their degree.
